North Natchez Drainage USACE Section 592 Program

Tramone Smith, Project Engineer and staff are recommending approval of Change Order #7, totaling \$1,327.70 due to the need that Marblestone Road was revised do to correct grade conflicts with the existing road initially set to remain. A portion of the road originally set to remain had to be removed and grades were revised to allow for installation of proposed drainage improvements. This increases the Blain & Sons contract from \$2,840,313.32 to \$2,841,641.02, with the completion date still September 5, 2021.

Motion by Alderwoman Hall, second by Alderman Frazier, the vote carried unanimously.

Carried over from 4.13.21 – Fund #329 is getting low on funds. Staff is reminding the mayor & board that on September 24, 2019 the previous board approved borrowing \$450,000.00 to meet project obligations when the contractors bid (and 3 alternates) were accepted. A motion was made by Alderwoman Hall, seconded by Alderwoman Irving (at the recommendation of Hayden Kaiser that **Weymouth Hall** is in dire need of repairs) to approve **JKS** to continue with the necessary change orders to (**Cemetery Road**) pending approval of grant funds, and pending legality questions being answered by the City Attorney. The original cost of the project was \$185,250 the new cost will be \$455,600. The City match will increase from **\$32,400** to **\$79,300**. **The vote carried unanimously**.

#188:04/21

A motion was made by Alderman Dillard, seconded by Alderwoman Hall to give the Fire Department permission to film a Public Safety documentary about the Rhythm Nightclub Fire and the effects thereafter (proposed by the National Fallen Firefighters Association). The vote carried unanimously.

• Alderwoman Irving asked that the public be notified whenever the streets will be closed while filming movies.

City Officials' Reports

Alderwoman Hall – Thanked Chief Daughtry and the men and women of the Police Department. She offered condolences to the family of the individual that was killed in Maryland Heights and to the Grinnell family. She also expressed condolences to her Merit Health family on the death of Renee Clark and to the biological family of Renee Clark. She spoke against violence in our communities. We cannot become numb to violence, we have to continue to speak out against it to bring to justice those who deserves it.

#189:04/21

A motion was made by Alderwoman Hall, seconded by Alderman Frazier to approve a scope of work and cost estimate for a small section of **West Stiers Lane** (beginning of West Stiers Lane to McIntyre) to give drainage and curbs to that area; give it to Jordan Kaiser & Session at a cost of \$600. The vote carried unanimously to Table this item.

#190:04/21

A motion was made by Alderwoman Hall, seconded by Alderman Davis to approve the repairs to a public right-away on **N. Wall Street** (12 feet X 90 feet) alley way, requires 23 tons of asphalt which will cost \$\frac{\$3,800}{}\$, the base cost of 20 tons is \$\frac{\$550}{}\$, this will include the labor and materials. The total cost of repairing a public right-a-way, that occurred over ten years ago, is approximately \$\frac{\$4,350}{}\$ to repair. The vote carried unanimously to take this item under advisement.

Alderman Frazier – Thanked Chief Daughtry and the men and women of the Police Department for the wonderful job that they did. It's sad about the murders and that so many people are killing. The Police Chief explained that they are still short of police officers. Thanked the Fire Department for responding to a fire at Mrs. JoAnn Bennett's house at 4:00 a.m. The filming crew of Crooked Letter noticed smoke coming from her house. The Police Department responded also, Mr. Frazier thanked them both.

Alderwoman Smith – Announced that the Police Department and the Sheriff Department had a great press conference and addressed crime and mentioned crime stoppers. The crime stoppers have an anonymous contact number which is 888-442-5001 or use the App: P3tips. She commended the **Jefferson Street Youth Group** for the great job they did during the cleanup at **Watkins cemetery**. There were seven candidates that applied for the NCPC Commissioner position; the committee, comprised of Alderwoman Irving, Alderwoman Hall and Alderwoman Smith, narrowed down the list to three applicants. The Board did chose one today, Mrs. Robbie Cade Furdge, she thanked the committee, congratulated Mrs. Furdge and conveyed her appreciation to all the candidates for their willingness to serve Natchez.

Alderwoman Irving - The Mayor and Board of Aldermen partnered with the Natchez Housing Authority, the Adams County Emergency Management, Adams County Board of Supervisors, the St. Francis Apartments and the Jefferson Comprehensive Health Center to give free Covid-19 vaccines, the second shot will be given May 12, 2021. It was successful, over 80 people were vaccinated. The Community-wide cleanup was a success also. The cleanup needs to continue around the city it will bring our community together. The city parks are one of the most important aspects in the city. Park provide open space they improve physical and mental health; strengthen our communities and make our city and neighborhoods more attractive. It's where we live work and they provide a space for children and families to connect with nature. Parks also increase the value of homes and neighborhoods. There is a dire need for attention to Jack Waite Park. There are piles of limbs and a tree stump that has been there for over nine months. School is about to end and she would hate to see an accident happen in that park. She asked if Public Works could start cleanup in this park. Armstrong Park is open and it could be locked. Since February 18, we have two trees that are down. Again, the concern that I have is that children play, they get injured, the city is going to be liable. There are things that needs to be replaced, the water fountains, the restrooms, there is a leak in the roof, it's not fitted for anyone to use. She would also like for Public Works to clean this park as soon as possible. School will soon be out and children will be looking for things to do.

Alderman Davis - Thanked the Fire Department, they did a wonderful job. Tomorrow, Colin will have a drive through College and Career Job Fair. Would like for James Johnston to check on grants there is supposed to be millions of dollars coming through FEMA for the Fire Department and Police Department. This money can be used for infrastructure among other things.
